



The Sin-Forgiving Sacrifice

Leviticus 4, 16

Hey! As you read the story, underline the parts you think are important.

Ashley, Eugene: Hi, teacher! Can we ask a question?

Teacher: Of course. What are you guys so curious about?

Ashley: The Bible talks about the tabernacle, but what was there? I mean, what is it?

Eugene: Yeah. Every time I read about the tabernacle in the Bible, it's so hard to understand.

Can you explain it to us, with very easy, simple terms, so we can understand?

Teacher: HAHAHA! That was the reason?! Well, then I guess you've come to the right person.

You see, when you study the tabernacle, you get to know Jesus.

Ashley: What? We get to know Jesus? Ah! That reminds me of that Pastor who spoke about the sacrifice at the tabernacle! Remember, in the Summer Retreat?

Eugene: Teacher, tell us about it. What happened at the tabernacle? And what does it have anything to do with Jesus?

Teacher: All right, then, kids. Listen carefully to the amazing story of the tabernacle!



Son: Hey, dad! All the people are gathering at the tabernacle. Is something special going on today?

Father: Today is the Day of Atonement. This is when we can be forgiven of our sin, as long as we follow the way of God. God has given us a way where we can be forgiven of our sins. It's the sacrifice we do every year.

Son: Oh, that! Yeah, I remember...But hey dad, I don't understand how our sins can be forgiven.



Father: Well, son, what we first need is some cattle to take our sins for us.

Son: Oh, so that's why some people were bringing goats before. Wait, so do the goats have to die or something? But they didn't even do anything!

Father: Well, yes. It's true that they don't deserve to die, but innocent livestock must suffer for us instead. You see, it's the blood that can save us, which is why we have to kill them in order to be forgiven of our sins. It's the way of God, which He has spoken to us.



The father and son joined the rest of the Israelites at the tabernacle and saw as the high priest put his hands on a young goat to transfer the sin of Israel to the goat. The high priest then killed the goat on the altar of burnt offering.

Son: Aw, man! Why does the goat have to die and shed all its blood like that? Does God hate sins that much?





Father: It's the only way, son. Now the high priest is entering the holy place. Inside is the holy of holies, or the Most Holy Place, which is where the high priest sprinkles the blood of the goat on the Ark of the Covenant. If God decides to forgive us our sins, the high priest will come out of the holy of holies safely, but if our sins are not forgiven, the high priest will die there.



Son: Well, it sounds like the high priest is still alive.

Father: Ah! Yes, son. This year, God has forgiven us all of our sins. Thank God.

Teacher: And that's what would happen at the tabernacle.

Ashley: Oh, so in the Old Testament times, the people were forgiven for their sins like that.

Teacher: That's right. Do you remember what I asked you before, right before you were saved?

Ashley: Uh, you mean about my puppy? You asked me if my puppy could die instead of me, and then you told me that it couldn't because God doesn't use that way anymore.

Teacher: Yeah, that's it. Animals can't die for us, but God has given us a different way.

You see, the Israelites had to give sacrifices every year for the forgiveness of their sins, but actually, that was an incomplete sacrifice. To make it complete, God sent Jesus Christ to this world, who is the one who died for us and why we can go to heaven.

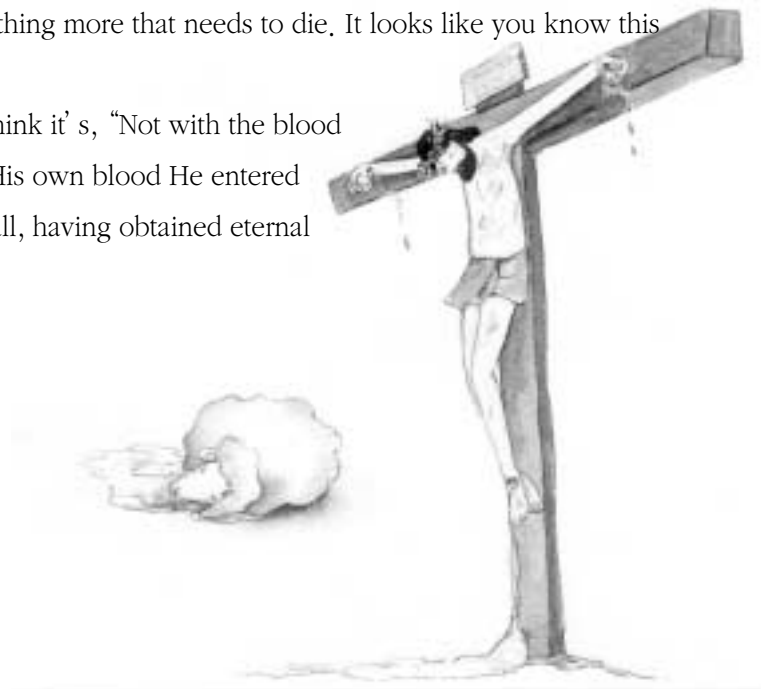

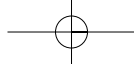
Teacher: Yes, that's right! That's why Jesus had to shed his blood and die. If there's no blood, then there's no forgiveness, you see.

Eugene: Yeah, and because Jesus died, goats and lambs don't need to be killed anymore, right?

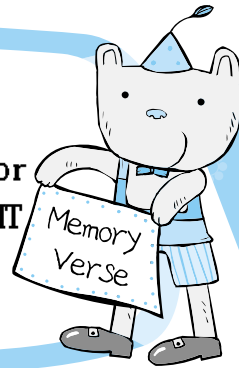
Teacher: Yup, that's right. There's nothing more that needs to die. It looks like you know this pretty well, Eugene.

Teacher: Yeah. Jesus died because of our sins, and in order to let us know that we have been made righteous (meaning our spirits are clean before God), He resurrected.

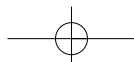
Eugene: Ah, that makes a lot of sense!
