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The Marriage of Isaac and Rebekah

...you will not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, among whom I dwell (Genesis 24:3).

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every () in the heavenly places in Christ, just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love (Ephesians 1:3-4).

Let us be glad and rejoice and give Him glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and His wife has made herself ready (Revelation 19:7).

Abraham, the father of Issac, wanted a woman to be his son's wife so that he can endow the inheritance of covenant. He did not want to select his son's bride among the sinful Canaanites but from his homeland. Therefore, Abraham's servant left Canaan to look for Issac's bride and stopped at the well in the city where Abraham's family once dwelled. With God's help, the servant easily found Rebekah among many young women in the city. After the servant tested the girl near the well, he was convinced that God guided him there.

The servant perceived Rebekah as a beautiful and diligent young lady compared to other girls. She was so dedicated that she served water to every fatigued stranger and his animals on their way to the long journey. Next day, Rebekah headed toward Canaan with the blessing from her family, crossed the wilderness to meet Issac, whom she has never met. Thereafter, Rebekah became a wife of Issac who was the heir of inheritance of covenant, and she partook her husband's glory.

The marriage of Issac and Rebekah explains the relationship between the Christ and the church. Issac is a type of the Christ and Rebekah, the bride, is a shadow of the church where born again christians are congregated. Issac was able to find his beautiful bride, Rebekah, through his father's faithful servant. Likewise, God sent the helper, the Holy Spirit to us in order to save the holy nation who is the bride of the Christ (2Corinthians 11:2) and who will live in the kingdom of heaven (John 14:26). God planned and prepared the church before the foundation of the world, and accepted us as partners in love (Ephesians 1:3-4). Thus, He saved us by sending His only Son Jesus Christ and adorned us as blameless brides in the church by the Word (1Thessalonians 5:23).

The feast of wedding will begin in the kingdom of heaven when the church is chosen as an adorned bride in the second coming of the Christ at the end of human history (Revelation 19:7). And they will live with God eternally.
